It includes posters and social media materials that can be adapted and shared across platforms.







Mpox Vaccination is available in the Grampians Region

Suggested accompanying text

Mpox is a disease caused by infection with the monkeypox virus. Anyone who has prolonged physical or intimate contact (skin-to-skin contact) with someone who has mpox can become infected.

If you're concerned you may have mpox, ask your doctor for a test.

To protect yourself, the mpox vaccination is available for eligible people. Two doses are required for optimal protection.

Mpox vaccination helps to reduce the risk of infection and severe disease in:

- ligible high-risk groups
- people who have had recent high-risk exposure to mpox

Stigma and discrimination for any disease are never acceptable. Stigma linked to mpox can undermine public health efforts or prolong a disease outbreak, as people may be more reluctant to come forward and seek care and treatment. For mpox, stigma, discrimination and racism have been particularly directed against communities initially most affected by the disease, namely men who have sex with men, trans people and gender diverse communities (World Health Organization 2024).




